LET'S CELEBRATE

From Rearing Feasts to Street Parties & Disco's

Rearing Feasts began in the late 18th or early 19th century as a celebratory meal given to workers on completion of a building, a tradition well recorded in Ryde.

IW Observer 19 January 1856

Hospitality Mr. entertained all the men engaged in the erection of his new hotel on the beach, at a substantial "rearing feast" on Tuesday evening last. This is one of the few good Old English customs still existent in this locality.

Hampshire Telegraph 4 January 1871

Servants - At the Ryde Borough Court, on Monday, Mrs. Sivier, of Sivier's Hotel, Pier-street, was charged with keeping three servants and neglecting to pay duty. The defendant was fined £5 and costs.

Sadly, the same newspaper, 22 February 1871, reported that Mrs Sivier, after a period of 'weakness' one night walked down the steps from 'Siviers' into the sea and was drowned.

Mr. Hutchings, who have been engaged in the erection of the new mansion known as Quarr Hurst, were, on the completion of the roofing, treated by the proprietor, W. Wruy, esq., jun., to a bountiful spread, provided by Mr. Gad Hill, in his usual excellent style. About 30 sat down. The chair was occupied by Mr. James Hutchings, who, by his kind and genial manner, added greatly to the amusements of the evening. After the usual loyal and patriotic toasts had been given and duly honoured, toast and song became the order of the evening. On the whole, a very pleasant evening was passed, tending greatly to establish that good feeling which should ever exist between the employer and employées.

REARING FEAST,-Mr. R. Yelf liberally treated the workmen of Mr. John Denham, builder, to a first-rate dinner on Thursday last, to celebrate the roof-rearing of a house in course of erection for him by the well-known builder and contractor alluded to above. The dinner was prepared at Yelf's Shades, the caterer being Mr. Nottage, whose "plentiful hospitality" on such occasions is become proverbial. In the course of the evening, after the cloth was removed, several songs were sung and toasts and healths proposed and drunk most heartily, and of course the invocation for the good health of the esteemed giver of the feast was responded to in a bumper with three times three. This old custom of rearing feasts is almost dying out, but we are glad to find that it still exists with the generation that brought it in.

The IW Observer, 15 November 1873, reported the 'House Warming' the previous Thursday evening, when 'on the invitation of Mr & Mrs Jas. Buckett of the Terminus Hotel, a goodly number assembled to do honour to a sumptuous dinner' for the opening of the new premises. So named because it was at the, then, end of the railway line from Ventnor, the journey to the pier having to continue by tram. 'All sorts of people, in all sorts of dresses, mechanics, firemen and burgesses' numbering about 60 sat down to a 'first class dinner'. The report ended by expressing surprise at 'so rich a treat flowing from a solitary Buckett'.

The courses were all in French. Huîtres [oysters] followed by Potage [two soups, probably oxtail or lentil]. The Fish course was turbot or epilans frits [fried smelts]; Entrées [the choice included veal]; Relevés [probably turkey, ham and lamb]; Rôt [roast – maybe potatoes etc.]; Entrements [seemingly seven different options including pastries]; Dessert and Coffee followed, making ten courses in all.

The Pier Hotel was also the venue for a grand banquet, for 30, in honour of Henry Brady, late district engineer of the LSW Railway Company. He was presented with a piece of plate worth 50 guineas. Mr and Mrs Barnes were complimented on the admirable way they had catered for the happiness of the party. The menu was similar to that of Mayor Whittington's. Entrees included 'Currie Chicken' and 'Salmi Pigeons', Revelees included goose and tongue, an additional game course of pheasants, wild ducks and leveret. Entrements included 'Sir Watkin Wynn Pudding'. The company were entertained by Tollervey's band. From the IW Observer report 15 November 1873.

DINNER AND SMOKER. - To celebrate the close of his first season as proprietor of the Albany Hotel and Mr. H. Restaurant, Pier-street, Sharp invited his friends to a dinner and smoker on Friday evening, which was held in the dining-room, and proved a very enjoyable function. Mr. L. Tayler presided, supported by Host Sharp, Mr. E. Broome (the "Solent"), Mr. S. Pack ("Com-mercial," St. John's road), and others. After a substantial and well served repast harmony prevailed in which Mr. Bert Chapman was highly entertaining with his songs and mono-Songs were also given by logues. Messrs. Walter Rymer ("Bay of Biscay") Salter, Barnet, Nelson, Pack, etc., Mr. Perren, senr., presiding at the piano with his efficiency. Several toasts usual efficiency. were honoured and Mr. and Mrs. Sharp were heartily thanked their for generous hospitality.





SUPPER AT THE WERES' HOTEL.—On Monday evening last, Mr. and Mrs. Denham, of the above hotel, gave an Old English supper, in honour of having obtained a full license. About 60 sat down to a first-rate spread, which was served up in capital style. Mr. William Lake, of the Eagle brewery, occupied the chair, and Mr. William Newman, contractor, the vice-chair. After the removal of the cloth, the usual loyal and patriotic toasts were given and heartily responded to, that of "The Host and Hostess" being received with great applause. Song and sentiment passed merrily round until the "forbidden hours" began to dawn, when the company separated, having spent a most enjoyable and happy evening.

Week's Hotel had opened in 1864 just as a beerhouse. Eventually being taken over by Mew Langton, it finally closed in 1970.

On Thursday evening, the workmen employed in the erection of the new Almshouses, had a "rearing feast" at the Albany Hotel, thanks to the kindness of Miss Brigstocke. About 40 set down altogether, and thoroughly enjoyed the capital dinner which had been provided.

IW Observer 5 February 1916

To celebrate VJ Day Mrs Sivell of Road collected Quarry necessary funds and some 60 children, from Alfred Street and Quarry Road sat down to a liberal spread. Afterwards the children waited on the grown-ups. Music was relayed from one of the houses, singing and games followed. After a visit from the Mayor, Mr Weeks and Mrs Weeks, they all went off in red, white and blue decorated buses around the town. On returning an effigy of Hitler was burnt on a bonfire and celebrations continued until midniaht.



She herself was got up in a novel manner her headdress being the 'Isle of Wight Times'. Miss Lambert's ladies' orchestra provided the music for about 100 dancers. Mrs Payne generously gave a two-tier wedding cake with bells etc., to be distributed half way through the evening.

On Coronation Day a number of street parties were organised. On account of the cold weather the Arthur Street event was held at the St. John Ambulance Hall and the Argyll Street party in the A.T.C. Hall. Both events were attended by the Mayor and Mayoress, who were warmly welcomed. There were also similar parties in the Haylands and St. John's areas. Mr. Thorne's field in Elmfield about 230 children from Harding and Great Preston Roads and Preston Close were entertained with sports and tea at which the Rev. A. J. Pearman (vicar of St. John's) presided. The Ryde Buccaneers presided. added greatly to the enjoyment of practically every street party in the borough when they arrived and distributed ice-cream to the children. Their visits were all the more appreciated because they came as a complete surprise. Their tour was organised by Messrs. A. V. Kervill (captain) and J. Charloe (vice captain)


The Mayor proposed a toast to the hosts, and in reply, Mr. Anthony Gale referred to the growing number of old boys joining the organisation


