Puckpool House was probably re-built in 1714 for Richard Roberts of Gosport. It was sold, in 1720, to David Boyes of Appley, who ended up in prison, so his estate was sold. After several owners it was bought, in 1822, by Lewis Wyatt, an architect, who made many alterations. When he died, in 1853, the property was auctioned and became the holiday home of Josiah Spode [of Spode China fame].

In 1861 the house and estate was purchased by the War Department. Puckpool Battery was constructed at the northern end.

In 1878 the War Department sold the house to Major-General the Hon. S.J. Gough-Calthorpe, of the nearby Woodlands Vale. Puckpool House and grounds was leased out to various tenants, before being sold again in 1923.

In 1937 the estate was sold to Seaton Holiday Camp [Devon] Ltd., a subsidiary of Warner's Holiday Camp. They spent £60,000 on erecting the holiday camp, which opened in June 1939.

IW Observer 24 May 1862

Rather Dangerous –At Puckpool, for several yards, the wall has sunk away completely rendering the passage most hazardous, especially to ladies. Now Puckpool is the property of Government, it is, of course, useless to talk about putting the wall in a state to walk upon.

The estate is studded with majestic and varied timber, which opens to a grand expanse of the ocean, from Calshot Castle to St Helen's Roads. It offers a choice and enjoyable property to a man of taste or a member of the Yacht Club.

The IW Observer, 26 November 1853, advertised a four-day sale of furniture at Puckpool, belonging to the late William Wyatt [sic]. Included were Brussels and Turkey rugs; Damask curtains; a handsome Rosewood bookcase and other quality furniture; an ormolu chandelier; stuffed birds; a set of armour; a percussion gun with powder; numerous beds as well as linen; 500 volumes of books; plate; choice hothouse plants, etc.



Military Movements -Wednesday last a battery of the 12th Brigade of Royal Artillery, commanded by Major Bellingfield, arrived at Ryde en route from Fort Elson, Gosport, for Puckpool and Yaverland. They appear to be a very fine body of men.

WAR DEPARTMENT PROPERTY. PUCKPOOL HOUSE, ST. HELEN'S, about 1 mile from Ryde, Isle of Wight. about 1 mile from Ryde, Isle of Wight. The IW Observer, 4 June 1892, reported on the Haddington Artillery Militia from Scotland on a training visit. Captain Walker gave the reporter a guided tour. The piece of ground to rear was more extensive than realized, with ample room for the long rows of tents accommodating the 600 men. Each tent was thrown open with beds and luggage neatly

The fortification of Puckpool is nearly or quite completed. The last detachment of the Royal Artillery from Puckpool Battery proceeded to Portsmouth on Monday last, as they have successfully accomplished the landing and placing in the Battery some 25-ton guns, which are capable of piercing some 141/2 inches of iron plates, backed with one-foot teak, with their battery charges at 1000 yards range.

Remarking on the small numbers of men present the reporter was told that 250 of them proceeded daily to 'Nomans Fort' for instruction. Some of those left behind cleaned the 25-ton guns at the Battery. The guns peeped through the grass covered embrasures. Some guns were painted emerald green, but this, apparently, made them easier to spot, they would have been

Men not on duty were in the reading tent, writing letters home, or reading newspapers provided by the officers. The men had a comfortable canteen and the sergeants had their own mess tent. The field kitchen was in the open air, where the cooks were preparing dinner of potatoes by the bushel and stew by the hogshead. Ryde town water was supplied by cart and was wellspoken of.

The officers' tents were to the west of the ground, with camp bedsteads, drawers and boarded floors. Their mess consisted of two large tents, one furnished as a dining room and the other as a drawing room. The band of the regiment performed at intervals, and had been engaged to give a performance on Ryde Pier. The medical profession under Surgeon Dunn, had little to do, the men being in the best of health.


The report ended by stating the officers and men are expecting a sudden attack on the Isle of Wight, which they will have to meet, but when the enemy will come of course no-one knows.


The inhabitants of Ryde and district had a most enjoyable time at the Theatre Royal on Wednesday afternoon and evening, when two concerts, organised by the Nodes and Puckpool Batteries, R.G.A., were given by kind permission of Lieut. Col. D. F. Nickoll, D.S.O, R.G.A., to packed houses both afternoon and evening, in aid of the Royal Artillery Commemoration Fund.



The Puckpool Battery Booklet gives a 'Guided Tour' of the Battery, starting near the Barracks [now the café] passing the Artillery Store and the Cartridge Store with a hoist to the Loading Room above, to the surviving Mortar Bays. There had been many changes over the years

At the time of writing the booklet the Aquarium and Aviary were in the shelters under the 9.2 inch guns. There was a brick Gas Decontamination Centre from WW2, but some buildings had been demolished, including the shell-filling Laboratory of 1871.

PUCKPOOL HOUSE & THE CARTER FAMILY

Although Puckpool House was a desirable property, just how peaceful would it have been so close to the Battery? In the 1880's it became the home of Edward Carter. The family were in residence by the summer of 1888, as, sadly, their only son, also Edward, died there on June 1st.

At Puckpool House in the census of 1891 Edward Carter was 42, a Barrister at Law, Farmer and JP, born in London. His wife, Mary Louisa, was 33. They had just two daughters, Mary, aged 5, and Dorothy, 1. They had a cook, Fanny Cole, 3 domestic servants and a nurse, Alice Rolf. Edward never practised the law, preferring to live the life of a country gentleman.

By the 1901 census, at Puckpool House, the family had grown, with four more daughters, Cecily then 8, Gertrude, 6, Eve, 5 and Kathleen, 1. Another daughter, Aveline, had died age 2, the previous year. This time there were eight living-in servants, a cook, Mary Grant, 4 maids, and 3 in the nursery, including Alice Rolf.

By 1910 Edward had moved to his parents' house, East Upton, after they had died. He died there aged 82, on 6 May 1931. He was one of the oldest members of the Royal Yacht Club and took an active role in local affairs and charities. He left his widow and five daughters. The ruins of the house after a disastrous fire show it would have been as desirable a property as Puckpool House.

SCHNEIDER TROPHY

Parking at Puckpool for the 1929 Schneider Trophy:

The charges for parking to be: Bicycles 3d, Motor bicycles 1/-, Motor cycle combinations and small cars 1/6, Large cars 2/6, Char-a-bancs 3d per seat (not including driver's seat), it is further resolved that in the case of cars driven by chauffeurs, the chauffeurs should pay for admission or seating in the ordinary way.





The IW County Press, 12 March 1938, reported that the Plans Sub-Committee of the IW Planning and Development Committee had approved a draft agreement for the holiday camp at Puckpool, despite some opposition.

Six new patterned private huts fitted with glazed doors are to be placed on the high ground at the east end of Puckpool Park, and tenders were invited for their provision.

Early OS maps showed only a blank area where the Battery was, but a later OS Map shows the site of the Holiday Camp.



The use of the Park and the Holiday Camp was curtailed by World War Two. In 1939 the Battery and the Holiday Camp behind became HMS Medina, used, until 1942 to train men for the Fleet Air Arm. The Observer Corps had a post on top of one of the Mortar Magazines, and there was an ARP post as well. In 1943 the 35th Maintenance Unit RN lived at the Barracks while they were converting barges into landing craft at Fishbourne. After the War the Battery resumed life as a Park.

It would appear that throughout its time as a Military establishment Puckpool Battery never fired a shot in anger.

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PUCKPOOL PARK & THE HOLIDAY CAMP

From the Ryde & Seaview Guide 1964 - Puckpool Park was laid out as a pleasure park some thirty-five years ago and is remembered nostalgically by many as the venue of some of childhood's happiest days. A notably feature is the ingenious way in which formal gardens have been discreetly introduced to enhance the scene without any way distracting from the natural beauty of the surroundings and some of the plants and flowers are of subtropical species which can only be grown under glass in other parts of the country. The explanation of this is to be found in the Meteorological statistics of the Air Ministry which show over a period of 30 years the sunshine enjoyed at Ryde in the summer is 25 per cent above the average of all British resorts.








From the IW Times, 16 March 1967. It was at 1.37 am that some youths saw trees burning at one end of Puckpool Park. Ryde Fire Brigade attended and found the café, known as the Dell, leased to Lyons, was at the centre of the blaze. Flames were sweeping the length of the 50 by 40 ft. single storey building, constructed mostly of timber. Station officer Leonard Williams directed operations for three hours before the flames were extinguished. There had been no hope of saving the building or clues as to the cause.

Damage to the café amounted to £3,000 and it was hoped to rebuild it in time for the summer season. Photograph RSHG

IW County Press 28 November 1970

Lifeguard Corps - Seventeen members of Ryde Lifeguard Corps attended the annual meeting at the Eagle Tavern club room last week. On the swimming side they had been fortunate to be able to use Warner's Puckpool Camp pool on Friday evenings during the summer. Their water safety and lifesaving courses for members of youth clubs were very popular.

The IW County Press, 27 May 1988 reported that Douglas Byrne, Curator of Puckpool Park's Wireless Museum, was tearing his hair out about whether they should have a licence for their ancient TV sets, using the old disused 405 system. Passed around various licencing offices - a lady in Bristol giggled 'licences for museum pieces, that's a good one!' The question finally ended up at the Home Office who said no licence was needed.

Open day at **Puckpool**

Island amateur radio hams will again be celebrating the birthday of radio inventor Marconi by staging a special open day at the Puckpool Park Wireless Museum.

The event, on Saturday April 25, will feature unique Marconi memorabilia and other exhibits including giant valves used at the Daventry transmitter which broadcasted wartime messages throughout Europe.
