A large illuminated Christmas tree was placed near the rostrum and at the side of the church was a beautifully executed crib made by the Ryde County Secondary Modern pupils and members of the Youth Club. Across the church were festoons of fairy lights.

**Holly** - Holly is one of the most distinctive of our evergreen shrubs and trees. It is easily identifiable by its waxy, spiky leaves and clusters of scarlet red berries.

Holly has long been associated with mid-winter celebrations and been gathered in great quantities for Yuletide decorations, both of the Church and of the home.

The berries, though eaten by birds, are poisonous to human beings, and children should be warned against them.


**Christmas Customs** - The Victorians threw themselves into charitable works with enthusiasm, giving Christmas boxes - presents of food and money to all the deserving poor of the parish, usually on the day after Christmas. It became a custom of the nineteenth-century Victorians for tradesmen to collect their "Christmas boxes" or gifts on the day after Christmas in return for good and reliable service throughout the year.

#### IW Observer 20 December 1856

Several old Christmas customs are extant in this locality. Bands of poor women "go-a-gooding," that is, wait upon the known generous rich for doles of various kinds; "Christmas Carols," are as numerous as holly berries, "Christmas Boxes," too, still survive, though many attempts have been made to suppress them.

#### IW Observer 19 December 1868

Soup to the Poor – Mr. W. Jenkins, late of Ryde, who has had a meat stall in the Market, gave notice of his intention to distribute a quantity of soup gratis. There were a large number of recipients, and about 200 quarts were given away at the commencement of the week.






In 1861 for crying any marketable commodity exposed for sale within the market 1s. first cry, and 1s. for the second and every other cry. As a servant of the town, who attended to the Town-hall and the Market House, the "crier" was given £20 a year. From a list of candidates that year, Mr Buckett was chosen as crier with a vote of 20.

About 1,330 " years worth " of old age pensioners enjoyed an after-Christmas treat at the Oakfield Inn on Friday. Bedecked in paper hats and waited on hand and foot, 19 O.A.P's (average age 70) were given a free evening by the pub's darts club.

Competitions and other moneyraising efforts throughout the year financed a sumptuous meal, and all the free drinks the veterans wanted.

Mrs. E. Sivier, wife of the landlord. with Mrs. M. Valvona, was responsible for the catering, and members of the darts team acted as waiters.

Mr. Perce Williams, on behalf of the guests, thanked the darts team for "a wonderful time."

Mr. Jack Newbery, chairman of the club, who told the gathering that he hoped the occasion would be repeated next year.



## **Christmas Novelties & Crackers**

The inventor of the Christmas Cracker was a man called Thomas Smith from London. In the early 1830s he started work as a small boy in a bakers and ornamental confectioners in London, selling sweets, pralines and gum pastilles. He was successful enough to leave and start up his own business in Clerkenwell, East London. In 1846 Tom turned his thoughts towards Christmas and came up with the idea of wrapping little toys and novelties in the twisted wrapping instead of sweets. After some experimentation Tom designed a wrapping that could be pulled apart – just like the cracker as we know it today. (Wikipedia)

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# Christmas Behind the Scenes

#### IW County Press 27 December 1913

The pressure at the Post Office came up to the usual Christmas standard. On the 24th December there were the heaviest parcel mails in, there being 297 parcel receptacles transferred. The 23rd was the heaviest day for letters, 247 receptacles being transferred. On December 24th the parcels delivered in the district numbered over 4,000, which is a record.

Gobbling Mail – Ryde postal sorters at the Union-street Head Office are engaged on a fowl job—dealing with 1,400 turkeys. The birds, pre-packed, are being sent to homes throughout the country by an Island poultry farm.

Prior to 1834, the Bank of England observed about thirty-three saints' days and religious festivals as holidays, but in 1834, this was reduced to just four: May Day, All Saints Day, Good Friday and Christmas Day. The Bank Holidays Act of 1871 was the first legislation relating to bank holidays and it specified Good Friday, Easter Monday, Whit Monday, First Monday in May, First Monday in August, Christmas Day and Boxing Day / St Stephen's Day as holidays. Before this Act was passed many Victorians already wanted to have the day after Christmas as a holiday.



#### IW Times 24 December 1896

Dickens Christmas Carol was the subject of the lantern lecture of the popular series in connection with the Y.M.C.A., given at the Town Hall, on Tuesday evening. Dr. Shirtliff was the reader. Carols were rendered by members of St. James's choir.

#### IW Times 2 January 1969

The Clarian Players held their Christmas party at the Anglesea Tavern on Friday, about 40 patrons and members attended, and Mesdames Barbara Turner, Mary Barham and Kath Galley served refreshments.

#### IW Times 11 December 1969

Shopping Spree – With only a few more "shop breaking days" to Christmas, thieves made the most of the weekend in Ryde. Staff at Fowler's, Union Street, arrived on Monday to find a number of fur coats and the safe stolen. At the Warwick Street premises of Vectis Office Equipment, raiders broke in through the workshop and took about £800 worth of 17 typewriters and four adding machines. About £5 in sixpences was stolen from a jar in a house at Westfield Park, Ryde.

Buccs' Hospital Tour – Costumed Ryde Buccaneers made their usual "Raids" on the town's shops on Saturday, gathering "booty" in the form of gifts for the old and needy, and hospital patients.

#### IW County Press 26 December 1970

St. Vincent's – The festive season at St. Vincent's Convalescent Home, Ryde, which is maintained by the Forces Help Society and Lord Roberts' Workshops, began with a sherry party and a film show for the 14 residents. Other pre-Christmas activities included the attendance of residents as guests at the Island Flower Club's Christmas party and the Presentation Convent's Christmas concert.

#### IW County Press 24 December 1986

Local celebrities' culinary talents went down a treat at the Ryde Gas showrooms during a 12-hour charity mince pie making marathon. By the end of the event, guests, including mayor of South Wight, Heather Humby, and television presenter David Icke, had made 1,330 mince pies, raising about £130 for the IW Special Olympics.

They were accompanied by the Island mascot, Annie the goat, looking very smart in her blue coat. A total of nearly £26 was raised for distribution to local old people.

Pupils from Ryde School raised £1,500 at their Christmas Fayre with the main event being a woodlice race. The woodlice were released into the middle of a specially designed board and pupils enthusiastically cheered them on as the first to the edge was crowned the winner.
